Foster Families Needed in Dodge County

Lunch and Learn Planned May 2

April 15, 2014 (Fremont, NE) – When a Fremont-area child enters the foster care system, odds are great that child will have to leave the community, as well as their home and school. Because of the scarcity of foster homes in Dodge County, 63% of the children removed from their homes will be placed in a different county.

Sadly, Dodge County also consistently ranks in the top ten of Nebraska counties for children placed in out-of-home care. All of these statistics underscore the importance of new opportunities to establish licensed foster homes in Dodge County. **Currently in Fremont, there are only three such homes available.**

On Friday, May 2, Lutheran Family Services of Nebraska and Project Everlast (*Fremont Council*) are hosting a "Fremont's Foster Caring Community Event." The event will be held at the Wooden Windmill, located at 1155 South Broad Street in Fremont.

The public is invited to attend this special lunch to learn more about the process and importance of becoming a foster family. The luncheon, which will be held from 11:00am to 1:00pm, will also include a special awards ceremony "Celebrating Our Superheroes," honoring those who have made a difference in the lives of young people who have lived in or aged out of foster care. The awards will be presented by Project Everlast Youth, an organization of young people who have aged out of foster care and now work to help those still in the system.
