


1 in 4 girls and 1 in 6 boys will experience some form of sexual abuse before age 18. (National Child Stress Network)

LFS is the largest resettlement organization in Nebraska, resettling 1,020 refugees in 2016.




Homeland of the 1,020 refugees resettled by LFS in 2016

94% of clients diverted from Emergency Protective Custody

Average response time of 23 minutes

Youngest child served was two years old

Oldest client served was 98 years old

1 in 7 Americans will develop a substance use disorder. Only 10% of people with a substance use disorder receive specialty treatment. (U.S. Surgeon General)

1,713 people were served in LFS substance use treatment programs. Of those reporting, 87% maintained sobriety or reduced substance use while in treatment.






