What is Kinship Care?

Kinship care is the supervision of children by relatives, or another adult who has a relationship or bond with a child. The goal of kinship care is to keep children safe and nurtured when their parents cannot fulfill those duties. Relatives are often preferred kinship care providers, as it helps preserve children's connections with their families.

The Benefits of Kinship Care

Kinship care is a more beneficial arrangement for children than formal foster care placement because of benefits like:

> Children are more successful when they live with people they know and trust.



- Kinship care supports family preservation. The children keep their family identity.
- It reduces trauma and feelings of separation and loss.
- It supports the child's community and culture.

The Kinship Care Program transforms communities and child welfare. It prevents children from entering the complicated child welfare system and supports kinship families navigating temporary delegation of parental rights, guardianship, or potential adoption.

Financial Support

While the state of Nebraska does not provide any stipend for informal kinship placements, Lutheran Family Services' (LFS) Kinship Care Program can help caregivers navigate possible resources that offer financial assistance.

• **2.4 million children** are cared for by someone other than their biological parents.

Nebraska

- **31,219 children** live in homes where a relative is the head of the household.
- **15,000 children** are currently raised by kin with no parent present.
- **1,096 children in foster care** are being raised by kin.
- **9,032 grandparents** are responsible for raising their grandchildren.
