Today, we navigate the shifting winds of the political climate, funding sources, and community needs.

We wiped away the remaining challenges left by the pandemic, earned statewide designation as a Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC), passed accreditation with flying colors, and filled Dana Village. We entered 2025 on solid footing, with an excellent five-year strategic plan and an eye towards exponential statewide growth, even beyond the nearly 20,000 people impacted last year.

It was a year of building tremendous focus and clarity on the future of LFS, and an outstanding foundation for us to manage the challenges ahead.

We took to the road to visit all of our teams and offices in 2024 -- a journey we called our "LFS Loves You" tour. We held open houses in every community, including our Council Bluffs, Iowa office. You'll learn more about that in coming pages.


Our commitment to reach and support anyone who needs us brought to life a new way of delivering behavioral health services across the state of Nebraska, as we were the only statewide organization honored as a CCBHC. This will allow us to deliver services addressing substance use issues, mental health needs, and crisis situations into communities currently receiving little or no support.

Our Children and Family Services programming pivoted towards the growing need for kinship care, expanding our offerings for foster care children and families. Our Children's Behavioral Health team moved into a new, larger location to support additional therapies and programming for children and teenagers. Our Refugee Resettlement program welcomed and supported nearly 1,300 people fleeing conflict in their home countries. It was a busy and full year. Here's a quick overview of LFS in 2024:



Behavioral Health (adults and children)

New evidence shows a deep and growing need for behavioral health services across our region, but especially in Central and Western Nebraska. There are simply too few providers available, with long waits for those who are. It's a widespread and challenging situation that LFS has been working to address, and in 2024, continued the extensive process of becoming a statewide CCBHC. Once fully launched in January 2026, this new model of care will transform communities struggling to meet those needs. Currently, underserved populations include older adults, low-income families, and young people - a population especially at risk for depression and suicide. Our crisis and co-responder teams continue to work closely with local law enforcement to reduce the need for incarceration during mental health crises. In 2024, our teams were very actively engaged in statewide trainings for mental health first aid and crisis intervention.

Children and Family Services

When Jonah* was released from jail, his first call was to his Fatherhood case manager. He began working on a fresh start while he was incarcerated and was serious about keeping his progress going. Within two weeks of his release, he secured suitable housing, a job, and began working on his GED so he can go to college. He's working with his case manager to improve his employment, but for now -- he's extremely proud of his first paycheck and being able to pay his bills and child support. He is taking the steps needed to preserve and restore a relationship with his children. Jonah is one of many of the success stories from our Fatherhood Initiative -- a growing LFS program that continues to impact the trajectory of lives, not just for the fathers, but for their children as well. So many of the dads tell us they are breaking negative cycles from their own upbringing -- whether their father was abusive or absent.

One of the highlights of 2024 was cutting the ribbon for Dana Village. This newer project is slowly bringing the former Dana College campus back into operation, starting with housing and services for

young people aging out of foster care and low-income seniors. After the February launch, the renovated apartments quickly filled.

Eighteen-year-old Charlie* was one of the new residents who left the foster care system and found her path at Dana. Initially facing uncertainty and limited financial support, she instead discovered stability. Her one-bedroom apartment at Dana Village is the home base where her dreams are coming true. She's enrolled in community college with plans to become a nurse. She's involved in a work experience program so she can find a job to support herself. In the interim, the transitional living program is teaching her how to budget, pay rent on time, and manage bills through life skills classes. She utilizes the food pantry when needed and has started a small savings account to participate in a car assistance program for former foster youth. Charlie definitely has her moments of being overwhelmed, but she's building a strong support system, including a mentor through Central Plains, a counselor at school, and a few close friends who are encouraging her along the way.





It's been fifty years since LFS first opened its arms to people desperate for a new place to call home. In 2024, we provided services in six locations and resettled over 1,300 refugees. We also provided a wide range of supportive services—including employment assistance, education, career pathways, case management, interpretation, and legal services-to more than 3,000 people.



In 2024, the Council on Accreditation completed its extensive review of all levels of LFS. The process takes place every four years, and this year the reviewers quickly renewed our accreditation, stating repeatedly how impressed they were.

One reviewer noted they talked to many clients across programs that demonstrate

the great work occurring. One client said until LFS, she had never had a caseworker with such a heart, who works so hard, and is there for her whenever she needs it. The individual noted that she had a mental health diagnosis most of her life with several suicide attempts, but after working with LFS for three years, she is now in a place she never dreamed she would be, living a balanced life, and living in a home that brings her great joy.



In Memory of Coyner Smith

In July 2024, we mourned with Coyner Smith's family as they said goodbye. Coyner and his wife, Donna, have been tremendous supporters of LFS since 2017, when they first delivered a check to keep refugee operations afloat. Their passion for refugees was fueled by their love for their adopted daughter, Leemah, and her mother. Coyner and Donna later set up the Smith Scholarship Fund, which has created future doctors, engineers, and attorneys. Coyner's company, Better Business Equipment, was once housed where the LFS Headquarters is today. In honor of the Smith's overwhelming commitment and support of the LFS mission, that building is renamed "The Coyner and Donna Smith Center."
